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## Assumptions

- Many problems at school reflect larger community issues
- Including our community will improve the effectiveness of MTSS
- Students needing more individualized supports are often supported by other service systems
- Building community means creating a larger network of collaborators

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

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
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## Interagency Collaboration at All Three Tiers




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### Tier 1 Examples

- Prevention focused activities (mental health, alcohol prevention, etc.)
- Creating links with local businesses and vocations
- Saturday workshops with families
  - Expectations taught at home
  - Positive strategies for homework completion
  - How to avoid coercive interaction patterns
  - Preventing problem behavior at home

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### Tier 1 Examples (Continued)

- Links for high school students with local businesses for transition to the workforce
- Possible space availability for events
- Mobilize resources for activities that benefit all groups
- Money donated from local businesses for MTSS efforts
- Students write grants to bring in MTSS funds for school climate

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### Identify Public Settings Where Students Congregate

- Help the community understand the importance of teaching and reinforcing positive behaviors
- Modify school expectations for the community
  - Library
  - Swimming pool
- Connect with corner store businesses
- Share information within community churches and spiritual centers
- Work with service systems to build supervised activities and settings for students after school

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## Community Forums

- Bring community members together
- Share major MTSS efforts
- Discuss major concerns community members have
- Brainstorm solutions
- Develop action plans that will connect school and community
- Recruit volunteers and resources for our schools

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## TIER 1 Key Features

- Prevention-based activities and supports
- Opportunity for **ALL**
- Community and family partnerships

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## Tier 2 MTSS Examples

- Supports from community agencies and organizations for students at risk
- Mentoring and academic supports from community organizations
- Partnership with local agencies

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## TIER 2 Key Features

- High efficiency & rapid response to needs
- Provided to **SOME**
- Efforts aligned with community organizations & agencies

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## Tier 3 MTSS Examples

- Create District Tier 3 Team
  - Meeting process (Monthly)
  - Monitor and evaluate progress on individualized plans
  - Leverage limited behavioral expertise
- Develop Interagency supports linked to District Tier 3 team
- Increase communication for Transition

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## Tier 3: Individualized Supports

- Small number of students with intense needs
- Functional behavioral assessment
  - Confirm hypothesis
  - Interventions linked to hypothesis
- Wraparound and/or person-centered planning
  - Strengths based
  - Family centered
  - Connects and simplifies services and supports
  - Creates vision for skill building & creating improved quality of life

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### Tier 3 Individualized Plans

- Interdisciplinary team forms around student
  - Education
  - Mental health
  - Juvenile justice
  - Child welfare
  - Community supports
  - Family
  - Friends
- Implemented across home school and community

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
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### SWPBS Organizational Logic



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## District-wide Planning

- Create vision for district
  - Include interagency collaboration
  - Discuss how the vision relates to preparing students for adulthood
- Establish the foundation and leadership
- Dedicate resources and time
- Build internal expertise
- Ensure sustainability

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## 7 Important Features of District-wide MTSS

1. District leadership team
2. District level coordinator
3. Sustained support from school board
4. Specialized behavioral expertise
5. Long-term plan
6. Team coaching
7. Data-based decision making

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
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## Levels of Community: Changing Contexts at all Levels



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### Examples of District Team Members

- School & District Administration
- Instruction & Curriculum
- Special Education
- Counseling, Social Work
- Safe and Drug Free
- Character Education
- Alternative Initiatives
- Drop-out Prevention
- Bullying Prevention
- Evaluation

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### Community Representatives in District Planning

- Family Members
- Mental Health
- Juvenile Justice
- Child Welfare
- Developmental Disability
- Family Advocacy
- Local Businesses
- Other organizations

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### Use SWPBS Planning Processes for Community Building

- Strengths-based model
- Create a vision and build consensus
- Use strong team processes
- Conduct a community self-assessment
- Create a planning team that represents your community
- Create an action plan
- Meet on a regular basis
- Use data for decision making

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## Community Development

- Identify unique strengths of your community
- Assess awareness of stakeholders to school strengths and needs
- Create better service integration for children
- Identify gaps in supports and services
- Collaboratively address issues that impact both school and larger community

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## Districts Implementing MTSS for Behavior

- Professionals invited to district meetings represent:
  - Career counseling and mental health
  - Child welfare professionals
- Districts are aligning Tier 3 team with interagency meeting systems
- District teams are recruiting mental health professionals to participate in Tier 3 Training
- Districts are writing grants with mental health partners:
  - Facilitate wraparound and service coordination (Tier 3 supports)
  - Create a family advisory group to participate in district planning

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## Districts Targeting Effective Transition

- Dedicate time to establish vision for expanded transition planning
- Include evaluation of transition issues in self-assessment
  - Students connecting with local vocational opportunities
  - Professionals attending district meetings from community
  - Focus of community forums include transition as key issue to discuss

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## Building local and Internal Expertise: District Trainers

- Each district identifies trainers who provide
  - Tier 1 Training
  - Tiers 2 and 3 Training & Support to Student improvement team
  - Tier 3 intensive individualized plan facilitation
- Experience in applied behavior analysis and/or positive behavior support
- District Tier 3 team creates links to professionals with mental health and knowledge of biomedical issues

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## Kansas Institute for Positive Behavior Support

- Highly intensive course
  - Monthly class
  - Year long training
  - Online assignments
  - Case studies with onsite support
- KIPBS Facilitators are trained across agencies
  - District teams seek out local facilitators
  - Partner with agencies (mental health, developmental disabilities) to support families
- Medicaid billing and reimbursement (home and community)
  - Kan-be-Healthy eligible
  - \$8,800 per child
  - Up to 6 cases open at a time

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
